After a day full of outdoor activities, guests at Twin Farms can relax and pamper themselves at the spa and steam rooms.

This 18th-century farmhouse retreat offers snowshoeing, canoeing, and even guided hikes, but many guests will be tempted to sleep late in the design-forward suites, eat multicourse meals prepared with ingredients from the property's own gardens, or just snuggle up in front of the fire.

Go if: You're seeking a romantic, rural retreat with luxury amenities.

Insider tip: Don't miss the *furo*, a Japanese soaking tub set to 104 degrees. It's just the ticket after a day of skiing down the private slopes.

Best time to visit: Autumn, when the Vermont foliage is at its best and the property's 300 acres of maples and pines are bursting with color.

Rate: Starts at \$1,500 per night based on double occupancy.
